DIGITAL DISCOURSE

Short description:

The course offers an understanding of digital cultural issues through one of the key methods of interpretation in the humanities – discourse analysis – employing both a sociolinguistic and a critical perspective on the relationship between language and technology. In the first part, we treat digital environments as multimedia texts, examining the various linguistic and other semiotic resources that we use in order to accomplish social goals such as identity, community, and conversation. In the second part, we develop a critical sensibility to the discourses about technology, examining how they end up shaping technological objects and us as subjects. We shall exercise these skills on a wide range of case studies such as emoji, selfies, memes, trolling, Wikipedia, gaming addiction, algorithms and more.
